PANMUNJOM, Korea (UP)

The head of the Swedish delegation to the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission said Tuesday Sweden "never imagined" the thankless task would last so long when she became a watchdog of the Korean peace.

"When Sweden accepted the offer to join the supervisory commission," General Tage Gronwall said, "it was never imagined that the work would last so long."

Gronwall's sentiments were echoed by Lt. Victory Stoll, spokesman for Minister Alfred Escher, head of the Swiss


