### Swedes, Swiss Seek Armistice Team Parings

PANMUNJOM, Korea (UP) — The head of the Swedish delegation to the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission said Tuesday Sweden "never imagined" the thankless task would last so long when she became a watchdog of the Korean peace.

"When Sweden accepted the offer to join the supervisory commission," General Tage Gronwall said, "it was never imagined that the work would last so long."

Gronwall's sentiments were echoed by Lt. Victory Stoll, spokesman for Minister Alfred Escher, head of the Swiss team.

"If a peace treaty is not realized within the near fu-

### Supervise Armistice

The Swiss and the Swedes, together with representatives of Poland and Czechoslovakia, supervise the hard-won armistice to make sure that neither side, according to the records at least, violate the truce by bringing new combat equipment into Korea.

They've been on the job since July, 1953.

Swiss and Swede restiveness was indicated strongly by the suggestion that each of the four nations cut down on the number of its personnel in Korea.

Gronwall pointed out, however, that there was "nothing urgent" in the request.

But he also said the two nations would like to know when their work would be finished.

Stoll also emphasized that there would be no "quick decision" to pull out of Korea.

But he pointed out, also, that Switzerland is finding it difficult to recruit men for Korea, and that costs to maintain the operation here were tremen-
